

You will engage deeply with classical rhetorical theory and contemporary AI discourse while building practical skills for academic and civic communication in the age of automation. Through a scaffolded, project-based structure that blends creative and academic work, students will develop rhetorical awareness, write in multiple genres, and collaborate on meaningful, real-world writing challenges.

Honors History 110

Title: History of the United States II

This course is an introductory study of the basic concepts, theoretical approaches, and methods of sociology. Topics include the scientific study of social interaction, structure, and organization; groups; socialization and the self; social stratification; culture and diversity; social change; and global dynamics. Topics and examples emphasize present-day America, including cross-cultural and multicultural analysis. This course is intended for students considering careers in counseling, teaching, social work, or nursing as well as anyone wishing to apply sociological ideas to everyday life.
