Apprenticeship is a time honored tradition of passing skills from one generation to another through a system of learning while earning, and learning by doing.

Throughout history, the world's most advanced civilizations have used some form of apprenticeship.

In Colonial times, apprenticeship provided the opportunity to become a skilled craftsman and respected member of society.

Combines:

- Paid on-the job-training with
- > classroom instruction that supports the work



DAS Goals are two-fold:

- 1. To match the needs of workers-for the skills to get and keep a decent paying job-with those of employers seeking motivated workers with the skills to do the job
- 2. To strengthen the apprenticeship alliance among industry, labor, education and government for recruiting workers and teaching the skills they and their employers need

3 Types of Apprenticeship Program Sponsorship

- Single Employer (Union or Non-Union)
- Joint Apprenticeship Committee (Union and Management)
- Unilateral Apprenticeship Committees (Non-Union/Management)



3 Types of Apprenticeship Program Models

- 1. Traditional: 2000 hours of paid on the job training (OJT) with 144 hours related supplemental instruction
- 2. Competency-based: minimum 6 months length with skills based demonstration and related instruction
- 3. Hybrid: minimum 6 months with the inclusion of industry certification

All programs require the same 2 components!



Classroom Instruction developed in cooperation with the CA Community College System and/or the Department of Education



Apprenticeship Requirements:

No experience necessary for most programs!

- 18 years old
- High School Diploma or GED
- Math Skills
- Reading Skills

Some programs may include testing or other pre-requisites for entrance to the program.



- Find an apprenticeship program by searching: county and occupation.





Search Tips


 Search the county that you live or intend to live when you are training;

• Select the county, and either leave the occupation blank for various occupations, or fill in a specific occupation such as plumber to search.

Information revealed when searched

- Trade or occupation;
- Program length;
- Starting wage;
- Minimum age;
- Education prerequisites;
- Physical requirements;
- Entry exams;
- Any additional prerequisites or requirements;
- Program contact information including address and training coordinator or program representative;
- When applications are accepted.

More tips on using the DAS apprenticeship program search

- Ask yourself what occupations suit your interests;
- Ask yourself what occupations you may already have some experience or skill;
- Check to make sure you have the prerequisites demanded by the program prior to applying;
- Contact the programs directly;
- Make more choices for yourself expand your training interests!
