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Introduction

California community colleges continue to focus on supporting transfer preparedness and access to affordable higher education, as mandated by legislation like AB705 and AB19. This focus is redefined in the Vision for Success document (2019), which sets ambitious transfer-related goals within the context of the complex challenges facing California community colleges. Perhaps the most ambitious goal in Vision for Success is increasing the number of students who transfer to a California public university by 35%. Challenges to accomplishing this goal include the high average number of units students accumulate before transferring, completion of transfer-level math and English courses, and achievement gaps among African American, American Indian/Alaskan, Hispanic, and Pacific Islander students. These challenges are compounded in the San Diego region by significant impaction at San Diego State University (SDSU) and University of California, San Diego (UCSD).

Transfer-related data is notoriously complex, as students come from diverse educational backgrounds, experience community college in a variety of ways, and transfer (or don't) for many reasons. To best situate SDCCD in this dynamic landscape, three metrics of student transfer are presented in this report: transfer volume, transfer rate, and transfer prepared rate. Data are disaggregated by college to show differences within the district, and by gender and ethnicity as part of the necessary equity lens for viewing data and information of this type.

Overview of metrics used in this report

Transfer volume is a broad metric which reports transfer data for students from varied academic backgrounds. Transfer volume depicts a holistic picture: *it is the raw number of students serviced by SDCCD who enrolled in a four-year institution in a given year*. Transfer volume identifies the overall number of transfers, which may be valuable information when used in tandem with enrollment trends to determine whether or not there have been equitable support services among segments in the population. Because transfer volume is not tied to a cohort, it is a snapshot of SDCCD students' transfer achievements in each of the last five years.

Transfer rate tracks a cohort of *students with similar qualities that characterize a particular transfer behavior over a specified period of time*¹. Because it is based on a six-year cohort, conclusions made regarding transfer rate are relevant to the six years prior to the end of the cohort.

Combined transfer prepared rate adds students who have made significant progress towards transfer but don't transfer or obtain an Associate degree to the transfer rate. To achieve transfer-prepared status, a student must successfully complete 60 UC/CSU transferable units with a GPA greater than or equal to 2.0 without earning an Associate degree. Transfer prepared students are evidence of both the work that community colleges are doing to achieve Vision for Success goals, and the challenges they face in preparing students for transfer and removing transfer-related obstacles.

¹ Students who complete six units in a three-year period and attempt any English or math course display *intent-to-transfer*. Such students are grouped by the year of their first enrollment at City, Mesa, or Miramar and the college they first registered. They are tracked for six years as part of a cohort. It excludes students with prior enrollment at a 4-year institution.


Methodology

Transfer Volume: Data for students who attended one of the District's three colleges – City, Mesa, or Miramar – were sent to the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) and matched against a transfer student database, which includes data from public and private 4-year institutions that enroll over 99% of all college students in the U.S.


Transfer volume in this report is the number of students who transferred from SDCCD to a 4-year university who met two conditions: (1) complete 12 or more transferrable units at any community college within six years prior to transfer, and (2) enroll at City, Mesa, or Miramar

within two years prior to transfer.

This methodology captures both students who were first-time students at another community college system and students who were first-time at SDCCD.




Transfer Rate: Data for the transfer rate tables and figures no longer comes from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) Data on Demand system. Cohorts are identified from SDCCD's Institutional Research database and this is the first report that attempts to replicate the methodology used by the CCCCO. Numbers at each individual college are lower because this methodology does not allow students to be counted at two credit colleges. The data includes three different cohorts whose outcomes (i.e., transfer to a 4-year institution) were tracked for 6 years each. Cohorts consist of first-time students at City, Mesa, or Miramar colleges who completed six units in a three year period and attempted any English or math



course². To calculate the transfer rate, the number of students who successfully transferred to a 4-year institution was divided by the initial cohort and then multiplied by 100. Students with NSC records to a 4-year institution prior to enrollment at SDCCD were excluded. This methodology was used for the three cohort groups included in this report. Prior transfer reports used data from the CCCCO's Data on Demand system to determine cohorts. This new methodology that relies on SDCCD's Institutional Research databases has resulted in smaller cohort sizes than from the CCCCO's Data on Demand.

Combined transfer Prepared Rate: Students who reach transfer prepared status, but do not transfer to a 4-year institution or obtain an associate degree, are added to students who transfer to a 4-year institution to calculate the transfer prepared rate. Students are transfer prepared when they have successfully completed 60 UC/CSU transferable units with a GPA greater than or equal to 2.0. The cohort parameters used to define transfer rate (first-time students at City, Mesa, or Miramar colleges who completed six units in a three-year period, attempted any English or math course, and have no prior enrollments at a 4-year institution) also apply to this definition of transfer prepared.



Cohorts are identified from SDCCD's Institutional Research database and this is the second report that attempts to replicate the methodology used by the CCCCO. Numbers at each individual college are lower because this methodology does not allow students to be counted at two credit colleges.

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² Due to blocks on data intended to protect student privacy, both groups used to report transfer volume and transfer rates may include students who initially took courses at another institution.

Highlights

Transfer Volume

- 1. Transfer volume has increased each of the previous five years. There were 1,161 more transfers (32%) from SDCCD to a 4-year institution in 2019-20 than in 2015-16, and 166 more (4%) than the previous year. *Page* 8
- 2. *Transfer Volume by Destination:* About two-thirds of students who transfer from the SDCCD colleges have transferred to a UC or CSU over the last five years (2015-16: 63%, 2019-20: 65%). *Pages 10 to 14*
 - San Diego State University (SDSU) has historically accounted for the largest percent of SDCCD transfer volume (between 29% and 33% of transfers over the last five years).
 - Almost half of 2019-20 SDCCD transfers went to a local public university (SDSU: 33%, UCSD: 11%, CSUSM: 3%).
 - Compared to 2018-19, transfer volume to UCSD and CSUSM decreased significantly among 2019-20 transfers (-10% and -44%, respectively).
- 3. *Transfer Volume by Ethnicity*: In 2019-20, representation in transfer volume by ethnicity differed from the following student populations:
 - White students, who were over-represented (35% of transfer volume compared to 31% of the student population),
 - Asian/Pacific Islander students, who were also over-represented (13% of transfer volume compared to 11% of the student population)
 - Latinx students, who were under-represented (32% of transfer volume compared to 38% of the student population).
 - African American students, who were under-represented (5% of transfer volume compared to 7% of the student population).
- 4. The rate of under-representation for Latinx students has decreased slightly since 2015-16, when they accounted for 29% of transfer volume compared to 36% of the student population³. *Pages 15 to 17*
- 5. *Transfer Volume by Gender:* Transfer volume by gender has been similar to the student population serviced by SDCCD across the last five years (up to 2% difference).

Transfer Rate

- 6. Transfer rates have increased, from 32% of the 2012-13 cohort to 35% of the 2014-15 cohort. Cohort size has increased or stayed similar at each college but the rate of students who transferred varies by institution. City College increased number of transfers and increased transfer rates slightly (+2%). Mesa College increased the number of transfers while the cohort size has decreased slightly. Miramar college transfer numbers in the 2014-15 cohort increased (+179) from the 2012-13 cohort and transfer rates have increased by 6%.
- 7. Overall transfer rates by ethnicity have stayed fairly similar (±1%) or increased for all groups. Transfer rates for African American students remain the second lowest⁴ at 30%, ahead of Latinx students (27%).
- 8. Overall transfer rates for female students is higher than male students (+4%).
- 9. The average number of years it takes students that transfer to transfer is around 3.5 years.

Combined Transfer Prepared Rate

- 10. Overall transfer prepared rates have decreased slightly over the last three years. However, there is a smaller proportion of students that are becoming transfer prepared without actually transferring. These students comprised 24% of the 2012-13 and 16% of the 2014-15 transfer prepared cohorts. While transfer prepared rates changed slightly for most student groups, they decreased since 2012-13 for Latinx students (-4%).
- 11. Most transferred prepared students have passed a transfer English course. Nearly all students that who passed transfer math also passed a transfer English course, showing that transfer-level math is a greater barrier to transfer prepared students than transfer-level English.

Transfer-level Unit Completion and GPA

12. There is a strong relationship between transfer-level unit completion and transfer course outcomes for students that did not transfer. A greater proportion of students with lower transfer course GPA have fewer transfer units completed. Students that did not succeed, or succeed well (below 2.0 GPA) in transfer-level courses do not continue to complete enough transfer units to be Transfer Prepared.

Transfer Volume

The number of students who transferred from a SDCCD college to a 4-year university has increased each year from 2015-16 to 2019-20. Compared to the 2018-19 academic year, transfer volume across the colleges increased by 4%. Growth in transfer volume compared to 2018-19 was most significant at Miramar College (+16%).

Figure 1. Overall Transfer Volume for All Colleges and by College 2015-16 to 2019-20



Transfer Volume by Demographics

Transfer volume has increased for each ethnic group over the past five years. In 2019-20, representation in transfer volume by ethnicity was within 1% of the student population for all groups except for white students (over-represented among transfers), Asian/Pacific Islander students (over-represented among transfers), Latinx students (under-represented among transfers)⁵.

While Latinx students were under-represented in transfer volume in each of the last five years, the percent of total transfers accounted for by Latinx students has increased, from 29% of total transfers in 2015-16 to 32% in 2019-20. Latinx students have grown as a percent of the student population from 36% in 2014-15 to 38% in 2018-19.

Transfer Volume: Top Transfer Institutions

A majority of transfer students from SDCCD have transferred to a California State University (CSU) or University of California (UC) institution over the last five years. The percent of all transfers to a CSU or UC has increased, from 63% in 2015-16 (2,333 of all 3,678 transfers) to 65% (3,145 of 4,839 transfers) in 2019-20.



Transfer Volume: Local Public Universities

Of 4,839 SDCCD transfers in 2019-20, almost half (46%) transferred to a local public university (SDSU: 33%, UCSD: 11%, CSUSM: 3%). The total volume of transfers to the three local public universities increased slightly from 2018-19 (+3%), however it should be noted that this was driven entirely by the increase in transfers to SDSU (+18%), while UCSD and CSUSM saw a decrease from the previous year (-10% and -44%, respectively).

CSUSM: California State University, San Marcos





Figure 6. Miramar College-Top 4-Year Institutions 2015-16 to 2019-20, by five-year total of transfers



Transfer Volume: Top Transfer Destinations by Ethnicity

The top 4-year transfer destination was SDSU among all ethnic groups over the last 5 years. UCSD was each ethnic group's second or third most common destination. National University was either the second or third most common destination by all ethnicities except Asian/Pacific Islander.


Transfer Rate

Transfer rate cohorts include first-time students at City, Mesa, and Miramar Colleges who earned six or more units, attempted any English or math course, and have no prior 4-year enrollments⁶. Compared to groups from which transfer volume is reported, transfer rate cohorts are more constrained.

Transfer rates, which track the transfer-related outcomes of first-time, intent-to-transfer⁷ students at City, Mesa, and Miramar colleges, vary by institution. About 1 in 4 City College students transfer within six years, a rate that remained relatively stable over the three most recent cohorts. Between 36% and 37% of Mesa College students transferred. Miramar College transfer cohorts experienced an increase in transfer rates – from 39% of the 2012-13 cohort to 45% of the 2014-15 cohort.

It should be noted that overall transfer numbers are lower than in previous reporting. This is due to cohort identification strictly coming from SDCCD's Institutional Research database and that cohort and transfer students are not counted at multiple credit colleges.

Transfer Rate by Gender

Across the colleges, the transfer rate for female students increased from 32% of the 2012-13 cohort to 37% of the 2014-15 cohort. Male students saw transfer rates decrease from 33% of the 2012-13 cohort to 31% of the 2013-14 cohort and increase to 33% of the 2014-15 cohort. These trends were similar at each of the colleges, with lower rates at City College, slightly higher rates at Mesa College, and highest rates for female students at Miramar College. Male students at Miramar College saw the largest change, from 36% of the 2012-13 cohort to 44% of the 2014-15 cohort.

Time to Transfer



Combined Transfer Prepared Rate

This section of the report contains data for the combined transfer prepared rate, which adds (a) the number of students who achieved transfer prepared status without transferring to (b) the number of students who transferred. Students achieve transfer prepared status by completing 60 UC/CSU transferable units with a 2.0 or higher GPA, but do not transfer to a 4-year institution or receive an Associate degree. The RP group identifies these students as, "at the gate" (The RP Group, 2017). This metric demonstrates the percent of each transfer cohort who had the potential to transfer, as these students completed all or most benchmarks typically required for transfer. The percent of students who achieved transfer-prepare status but did not transfer (Figure 9) includes students who may have applied but were not accepted by a 4-year university and students who experienced life situations that prevented enrolling at a 4-year university.

The combined transfer rate for the three colleges declined 1% from 2012-13 to 2014-15. This is different from an overall 3% increase in transfer rate. City College shows the largest percent of students that are transfer prepared but did not transfer (Figure 9). All three colleges show a smaller percentage of students becoming transfer prepared but not transferring.

Figure 8. Combined Transfer Prepared Rate by College



Transfer Prepared Students Completion of a Transfer level English and Math

Transfer Prepared students are students with 60+ UC/CSU units and a GPA of 2.0 or higher. However, to be considered transfer prepared the student does not need to have passed transfer-level math or English. Most transfer prepared 2014-15 cohort students who passed transfer math also passed a transfer English course, regardless of college (City: 99%, Mesa: 100%, 98%). Two-thirds of students that passed transfer-level English also passed a transfer-level math course although it varies by college (City: 55%, Mesa: 66%, Miramar: 69%). This is evidence that passing transfer level math is a barrier for many transfer students; it should be noted that the transfer window for students in these cohorts ended prior to the district's compliance with AB705, wherein all students are recommended to enroll in transfer level math and English.

- 3. Include transfer-level English and transfer-level math completion rates for transfer students.
- 4. Expand transfer-level English criteria to include more than one English course in order to satisfy Oral Communication, Written Communication, and/or Critical Thinking.
- 5. Review transfer report methodology to incorporate the RP Group's *Through the Gate: Mapping the Transfer Landscape for California Community College Students*.
- 6. Establish data agreements with the National Student Clearinghouse degree verify (in addition to knowing where the student transferred to, know if the student received a degree or not at that institution), to allow degree completion rates at transfer institutions.
- 7. Foster ways for transfer prepared students to complete transfer-level math when that is a barrier to their transfer.
- 8. Support early intervention strategies for transfer rate cohort students that receive non-successful grades (D or F) in transfer courses.
- 9. Perform qualitative studies on students that are transfer prepared with transfer-level English and math complete but have not transferred.
